P reface

In the Fall of 2014, the Office of Institutional Research, Planning, and Assessment (OIRPA) at Pfeiffer University spearheaded the formation of an institution-wide Data Integrity Committee. Patterned after a similar committee formed at Methodist University, Pfeiffer's Data Integrity Committee was conceived of and formed as a cross-functional team, with representatives from key offices across the University, particularly those departments who bear responsibility for the entry and maintenance of student records in Pfeiffer's Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system (Jenzabar). Principal members of Pfeiffer's Data Integrity Committee came from the following administrative units: Office of Admissions, Office of Financial Affairs, Office of Financial Aid, Office of Institutional Research, Planning, & Assessment, Office of the Provost, and Office of the Registrar.

Pfeiffer's Data Integrity Committee elected to review five general areas related to the keying of student records into the Jenzabar ERP system:

- 1. Data entry
- 2. Data records maintenance
- 3. Consistency in querying of data
- 4. Consistency and accuracy in communicating and reporting of data
- 5. Review of policies and changes in policies that might affect any of the above.

Since the 2014-2015 Edition of the Pfeiffer University Fact Book, that and subsequent editions incorporate some of the work undertaken by the University's Data Integrity Committee. In particular, the Office of Institutional Research, Planning, and Assessment conducted its own internal review of the Jenzabar ERP System, including (but not limited to) the selection of appropriate tables and fields for the querying and extraction of data, the values to assign to key fields to ensure that queries extract the intended data, the reliability and validity of data fields, repeated use of consistent querying methods, as well as reporting on missing and/or inconsistent data patterns. For example, in any given Fall Term, there are at least a few students whose enrollment records are found in two divisions, typically Undergraduate and Graduate. The committee decided to include these individuals once per the highest division of their enrollment.

As a result of the multiple efforts to increase data reliability and validity, OIRPA is quite confident in the robustness of the data used in the production of this edition of the Fact Book. To these ends, the 2015-2016 Edition of the Pfeiffer University Fact Book does contain certain clarifications to data as presented in prior year editions. Where appropriate, such clarifications are identified in the technical note, usually located at the bottom of the page, below the chart in question. The reader should pay special attention to these notes, as they provide language that both explains and clarifies the method used in extracting and analyzing the summary of the chart in question.

History of the University

Pfeiffer University originated from one of at least 15 home-schools founded by Miss Emily C. Prudden between 1885 and 1909. The seventh-generation descendant of Peter Prudden - a pioneer Congregational minister in Connecticut - Miss Prudden spent 30 years opening educational opportunities to young people in remote regions of the Carolinas. Having once placed a home-school in operation, it was her practice to deed its care to a church mission society, before moving to a new area in order to initiate another project.

Pfeiffer developed from the Oberlin Home and School, reportedly named in memory of John Oberlin, whose service as a minister and social pioneer in the rural valleys of Alsace, France inspired Miss Prudden's own interests. The Oberlin Home and School began at Lick Mountain, near Hudson in Caldwell County, North Carolina. In 1903, the Women's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church agreed to assume responsibility for the Oberlin property. Following the transfer of 37 acres and 2 buildings on June 8, 1903, the Oberlin school was renamed the Ebenezer Pfeiffer Home and School, in memory of the stepson of Mrs. Mary A. Pfeiffer of Dayton, Ohio, whose generosity facilitated completion of improvements to the property.

A fire on January 14, 1908 led to the relocating of the Pfeiffer Home and School. The structure housing faculty and students was destroyed and the school moved to temporary quarters in nearby Lenoir. These quarters soon proved inadequate

The Pfeiffer Home and School then moved to Misenheimer in February 1910, with the acquisition of the present property. A new and spacious building was erected. In 1913, high school diplomas were issued. Another fire in 1914 severely damaged the main school building in Misenheimer, again requiring reconstruction and adjustments to the academic program. A men's dormitory withstood destruction.

A junior university curriculum was added in 1928. In 1934, the N.C. State Department of Public Instruction granted accreditation to Pfeiffer Junior University. The introduction of elementary studies by county schools permitted the school to eliminate lower grades and to direct its efforts towards collegiate-level work. The name Pfeiffer Junior University was first used for the 1935-1936 academic year in honor of Henry and Annie Merner Pfeiffer of New York City. The couple's philanthropy prompted the construction of four brick buildings and President's Home in 1935. The renaming of the university eliminated a problem of identification with Pfeiffer University, a junior university for women in Statesville. In 1942, both the Southern Association of Universities and Secondary Schools and the University Senate of the Methodist Church accredited Pfeiffer as a junior university.

In 1954, encouraged by a bequest from Mr. G. A. Pfeiffer, brother of Mr. Henry Pfeiffer, the University broadened its program to included senior university work.

Matching a grant of \$750,000 from the Gustavus and Louise Pfeiffer Foundation, the University in 1956 added more than \$1,500,000 in assets. Since that time, it has expanded dramatically in enrollment and facilities. The Southern Association of Universities and Schools accredited the four-year program in 1960.

Following a two-year study, the Western North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church voted in 1961 to sponsor Pfeiffer University and to extend financial support in a cooperative arrangement with the Women's Division of Christian Service. Supported by church agencies, foundations, public-spirited businesses, alumni, individuals, and devoted service on the part of faculty, staff, and trustees, Pfeiffer has continually grown in academic excellence, developing new programs to meet the needs of its students and emphasizing the ideals of Christian service.

The Charlotte Campus opened in 1977 with undergraduate classes in Criminal Justice. The first graduate program began in 1985 with a MBA curriculum, followed by a Master in Christian Education in 1989 and a dual MBA/MHA degree in 1993. The Charlotte operation occupied several locations as its enrollments mounted. An Adult Studies Program was implemented at Charlotte in Fall 1995.

To address the institution's expansion and graduate-level involvements, as well as include a growing population of international and non-traditional students, the Board of Trustees at its Spring 1996 meeting voted to reorganize Pfeiffer's academic structure towards University status—effective May 15, 1996. In addition, in 1999 Pfeiffer initiated course offerings in Locust, the fastest growing community in Stanly County, to accommodate the educational demands of an expanding community neighboring Mecklenburg County. Continuing Pfeiffer's efforts to provide flexible and affordable graduate programs, the MBA program also began offering courses via the Internet.

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
nrollment at Pfeiffer University

From Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, Pfeiffer's total Fall enrollment evidenced a general downward trend, declining from a high of 2,122 in Fall 2006 to a low of 1,624 students by Fall 2015, a net decrease of about 23% (N=498) over the decade in question. The data are clear. Since Fall 2006, enrollment at the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancement Division is down about one-fourth (27%). Enrollment at the

Undergraduate Misenheimer Division is down 17%. And, enrollment in the Graduate Studies Division is down 28%. However, if one compares the highest enrollment in the Graduate Studies division during Fall 2012 (N=1,064), enrollment in this division fell by about one-third (34%) in four years. Chart 1 presents Fall enrollment by division from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015.

In Fall 2015, four students who had coursework in two divisions (UG and GR) were coded with their primary division as UG, instead of GR. The Fall 2015 Total Headcount by Division remains unduplicated.


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Percent by Division

Between Fall 2006 and Fall 2015, the Graduate Studies division (GR) had the largest percentage of total enrollment, followed by the Undergraduate Misenheimer (UG MC) division, and then the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancment (UG CPA), division. Even though enrollment in each of the respective divisions experienced growth and decline, when comparing the years opening and closing the decade in question, enrollment did not change very much. Regardless, the most pronounced shift is observed in the Graduate Studies division, which experienced a net growth of 6% from Fall 2006 (46%) to Fall 2012 (52%) and then a net loss of 8% in just four

years from Fall 2012 to Fall 2015 (44%). It is important to emphasize that within any given Fall semester, the percentage enrollment by any one division is relative to the total enrollment in that Fall semester (see Chart 1). For example, that the percentage of total enrollment grew at the Undergraduate Misenheimer Division from Fall 2012 to Fall 2015 is primarily a function of a loss in enrollment at the Graduate Studies Division. Chart 2 graphs the percent of total Fall enrollment by division from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015.


Fall Credits Taken Over 10 Years: Total Credits by Division

From Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, the total number of credits taken across Pfeiffer University decreased by 5,013 credit hours (-22.9%) from 21,855 to 16,842. The general trend of a decline in overall credit hour production at the University is clear. Over the course of the decade in question, credit hour production at the Undergraduate Misenheimer Division (UG MC) is down 13% (n = -1,579 cr hrs). At the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancement Division (UG CPA), production is down

by 40% (n = -1,560 cr hrs), and credit production at the Graduate Studies Division is off by 32% (n = -1,874 cr hrs). However, if one considers the Fall 2012 semester as the high point of credit hour production for Graduate Studies, then production is down 35% (n = -2,156 cr hrs) over the span of four years. Chart 3 graphs the total number of fall credits where a grade was earned by division from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015.

Trend Analysis: Fall 2006 - Fall 2015




Fall Credits Taken Over 10 Years: Percent by Division

During the decade from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, the percent of total credits taken in the Misenheimer Undergraduate Division (UG MC) increased from 55% to 62%, a net increase of 7%. Over the same time period, the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancement Division (UG CPA) saw a 4% net decrease in credit hour production, from 18% to 14%. Over the past ten years, credit hour production in

the Graduate Studies Division has ultimately declined, from 27% to 24%. However, from its height in Fall 2012, and then to Fall 2015, credit hour production for the Graduate Studies Division fell by 7%. Chart 4 graphs the percent of total fall credits by division from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015.


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: The Gender Gap

Over the past decade, the number of Pfeiffer's female students decreased by 23% (N=308), from 1,338 in Fall 2006 to 1,030 in Fall 2015. The total number of male students fell by 24% (N=190), from 784 to 594 over the same time period. Pfeiffer's highest female enrollment (N=1,373) occurred in Fall 2012 and the highest male enrollment (N=787) occurred in Fall 2007. Pfeiffer's lowest female (N=1,030) and male (N=594) enrollments over the past ten years occurred in Fall 2015. The marked

decline in enrollment by female students from Fall 2012 to Fall 2015 is accounted for largely by decreased enrollment by women in the Graduate Studies Division. Despite this recent decline, the ratio of females to males has held fairly constant over the past decade at approximately 2-to-1, though it has declined to 1.75-to-1 in Fall 2015. Chart 5 graphs the total enrollment by gender from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. Appendix A details the number and percent change over time by gender and by division.


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Enrollment by Ethnicity

Between Fall 2006 and Fall 2015, Pfeiffer University's total minority enrollment decreased slightly from 33% to 31%. For most of the decade, non-minority enrollment hovered at about 60% (+/- 3% any given year), until Fall 2014, when non-minority enrollment fell to 54%. Related, enrollment by students whose race/ethnicity is generally classified as "Other" (including unknowns/nonreporting) was about 7% (+/- about 2%) any given Fall term, until Fall 2014, when students in this third racial/ethnic classification jumped to 16%. The sharp change in Fall 2014 can partially be

accounted for by a distinct increase in students whose race/ethnicity was "Unknown" or "Not Reporting." Most of these students are found in the Undergraduate Misenheimer Division. Chart 6 graphs the percentage of total enrollment by minority and non-minority students and nonresident aliens/unknown from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. Appendix B details the number and percent change over time by ethnic group and by division.


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Percent by Age

In Fall 2006, students who are "25 years of age or older" represented 65% of total enrollment. By Fall 2015, however, students who are "25 years of age or older" represented 56% of total enrollment, a net decrease of 9% over the decade. In Fall 2006, the percentage of students "Under 25 years of age was 35%." By Fall 2015, that percentage was 44%. A partial explanation for the decline among those aged 25

and older over the past ten years is found in the loss of enrollment among the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancement Division and the Graduate Studies Division. Chart 7 graphs the percent of total fall enrollment by age from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. Appendix C details the number and percent change over time by age and by division.


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: By Home Residence

In-state students constitute the largest share of fall enrollment at Pfeiffer University. Between Fall 2006 and Fall 2015, the highest number of Pfeiffer University's in-state enrollment occurred at the beginning of the decade in question, with 1,754 in-state students enrolled at Pfeiffer. The Fall 2015 in-state enrollment (N=1,296) is a 26% decrease since Fall 2006 and marks the smallest enrollment by in-state students during the past ten years. The amount of out-of-state students ranged from a high of 279 in Fall 2009 to a low of 214 in Fall 2015, a decline of 23%. Until recently, the Inter-

national student population remained fairly steady at approximately 130 students per year who hail from countries other than the United States. However, this population also declined to its lowest point in Fall 2015 (N=114). Chart 8 graphs total enrollment by home residence since Fall 2006. Appendix D and Appendix E, respectively, each detail the number and percent change over time by home residence and by division.


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Home Residence by Top NC Counties

By far, the county with the greatest representation of students at Pfeiffer University is Mecklenburg County, followed by Stanly, and then Wake (using Fall 2015 figures for benchmarking). From Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, enrollment by students from Mecklenburg County declined by 34%, from 576 in Fall 2006 to 382 in Fall 2015. The number of students hailing from Stanly County declined by 38%, from 189 in Fall

2006 to 118 in Fall 2015. The number of students from Wake County fell by 31%, from 159 in Fall 2006 to 110 by Fall 2015. Chart 9a graphs the total enrollment by the top 3 counties from Fall 2006 through Fall 2015, rank-ordered by enrollment in Fall 2015. Appendix F contains enrollment by county and by division.

Trend Analysis: Fall 2006 – Fall 2015 (Unduplicated Headcount)





Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Home Residence by Top NC Counties

Chart 9b shows the various counties from which Pfeiffer University students hailed in Fall 2015. Most students come from Mecklenburg County, followed by Stanly, Wake, and Cabarrus Counties, then Rowan, Guilford, and Durham Counties, followed by Randolph, Union, Forsyth, Davidson, Gaston, and Iredell Counties. Pfei-


Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Distance Learning Course Offerings

Over the past decade, the total number of distance learning (DL) course offerings grew by almost 40% from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. From Fall 2011 to Fall 2012, there was a sharp decline in DL course offerings, but there has been steady and sharp growth in DL course offerings from Fall 2012 through Fall 2015. From Fall 2006 to Fall 2013, the Undergraduate Center for Professional (UG CPA) Division tended to offer the most distance learning courses, followed by the Graduate Studies Division, and finally the Undergraduate Division at Misenheimer (UG MC). In any given

year, about 50% of all distance learning courses are offered by the UG CPA Division, about 40% are offered by the Graduate Studies Division, and the remaining 10% or so are offered by the UG MC Division. However, starting in Fall 2014, more than half of all DL course offerings were through the Graduate Studies Division. Chart 10 graphs the total number of Fall DL courses offered by each division from Fall 2006 through Fall 2015. Detailed information on DL sections can be found in Appendix G.

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
Fall Enrollment Over 10 Years: Distance Learning Student Registrations

Between Fall 2006 and Fall 2015, the total number of students registered (seats) in distance learning courses grew by 40%, from 1,002 in Fall 2006 to 1,405 in Fall 2015. For most years, Undergraduate students in the Center for Professional Advancement Division (UG CPA) comprised around 55% to 60% of all Distance Learning registrations. Since Fall 2012, more student registrations have come from the Graduate Studies Division (about 50 to 55%). It was only in the last couple years

that the Misenheimer Undergraduate Division (UG MC) has accounted for about 10% of all Distance Learning Student Registrations. Previously, no more than about 5% of all seats were typically occupied by UG MC students in any given Fall term (except Fall 2008). Chart 11 graphs the total number of Fall Distance Learning student registrations by division from Fall 2006 through Fall 2015.



Fall 2015 Enrollment: Distance Learning Class Size by Division

Chart 12 portrays summary statistics on distance learning (DL) class size by division for Fall 2015. In Fall 2015, the UG CPA Division had the largest maximum class size (n=36), as well as the largest average class size (y-bar = 16.9). The Graduate

Studies Division and Undergraduate CPA Divisions had the smallest minimum class size (n=1). The Undergraduate Division at Misenheimer had the largest minimum class size (n=5).

Fall 2015 Enrollment: Gender within Division

In Fall 2015 (Chart 13), there were 1,030 female and 594 male students enrolled. Females represented 63% and males 37% of the total university enrollment (N=1,624 unduplicated headcount). Chart 14 examines enrollment by gender for the three divisions. The Graduate Studies Division contains the greatest number of female students with 497, followed by the Undergraduate Misenheimer Division (N=360)

and finally the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancement (CPA) Division (N=173). The Undergraduate Misenheimer Division has the most male students enrolled (N=320), followed by the Graduate Studies Division (N=210), and then the Undergraduate CPA Division (N=64).

Chart 13. Fall 2015 Enrollment by Gender Total Enrollment (N=1,624 Unduplicated Headcount)





Chart 14. Fall 2015 Enrollment by Gender within Division


Fall 2015 Enrollment: Ethnicity

Caucasian students make up 54% of Pfeiffer University's Fall 2015 enrollment. African American students constitute for the next largest race/ethnicity present at the university (26%). The remaining 20% of students are of the other races/ethnicities


Fall 2015 Enrollment: Ethnicity within Division

Diversity fluctuates by location and division. Caucasian students are fairly evenly divided between the Undergraduate Misenheimer (UG MC) (N=392) and Graduate Studies Divisions (N=399), respectively. Most African American students (N=225) are enrolled in the Graduate Studies Division, followed by the Undergraduate Center for Professional Advancement (UG CPA) Division (N=123). Students of other racial/

ethnic backgrounds are found in a fairly even distribution among the three divisions. Fall 2015 Enrollment: By Age

In Fall 2015 students who are "30-44 years of age" represent the largest age group (27%) enrolled at Pfeiffer. Students "20-24 years of age" constitute the next largest age group (26%), followed by students aged "19 and under" (18%), and then students "Age 45+" and "25-29" (16% and 13%, respectively). Chart 17 graphs the Fall 2015 percent of total enrollment by age. Variations in student age highlight the uniqueness of students served by location and by division. The highest percentage of enrollment

served in one location may be the lowest percentage at another. In Fall 2015, the Undergraduate Division at Misenheimer served almost all of the students aged "19 and under" and most of the "Age 20-24" age group. On the other hand, the Undergraduate CPA Division and the Graduate Studies Division serve most of the students in the older age groups (25 years and older). Chart 18 compares enrollment in Fall 2015 by age within division.

Chart 17. Fall 2015 Enrollment by Age Total Enrollment (N=1,624 Unduplicated Headcount)





Chart 18. Fall 2015 Enrollment by Age within Division
Total Enrollment (N=1,624 Unduplicated Headcount)





Fall 2015 Enrollment: By Home Residence

In Fall 2015, 80% of Pfeiffer University students came from North Carolina. 13% of the remaining US students are from outside of North Carolina. The three highest enrollments from out-of-state are South Carolina (N=39), Virginia (N=26), and Florida (N=20). 7% of students hail from nations other than the United States. 12% of international students come from Canada (N=14), 9% come from the United Kingdom (N=10), and 8% hail each from China (N=9) and Spain (N=9). Chart 19 depicts enrollment in Fall 2015 by home residence. The table to the right lists the various countries from where International students hail. Detailed enrollment figures by home state can be found in Appendix E.



Fall 2015 Enrollment: By Undergraduate Degree

In Fall 2015, the Division of Arts and Sciences and the Division of Business, respectively, each accounted for 31% of enrollments of all Undergraduate students (both Misenheimer and Center for Professional Advancement). The next largest percent of total Undergraduate enrollment was found in the Division of Applied Health Sciences (26%). The Division of Education accounted for 8% of all undergraduate students

enrolled in the Fall 2015 semester. Students enrolled in certificate programs or whose major was undeclared made up the remaining 7% of undergraduates. Chart 20 shows the percent breakdown of all Undergraduate students at Pfeiffer by academic division.

Of the top 20 degree programs (as determined by Fall 2015 enrollment) in the Misenheimer Undergraduate Division, 45% (n=9) lost enrollment from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. 40% (n=8) of these top 20 programs saw increases from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, with newer programs seeing tremendous growth. Fall 2008 saw the inception

of the Busisness Management and Leadership/MBA combined 3-2 program. In Fall 2009, Pfeiffer University launched its Nursing and Pre-Nursing programs. Detailed information on program enrollment can be found in Appendix H.





Chart 25 provides enrollment figures by degree program for the Graduate Studies Division from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. Barely one-fourth (n=4) of all programs grew over the decade in question. The remaining approximately 75% (n=11) lost enrollment between Fall 2006 and Fall 2015. This is not surprising, given the overall decline in enrollment among the Graduate Studies Division. It should be noted that

even though the different Master of Education programs have lost students, changes in teacher pay and compensation passed by the North Carolina State Legislature in prior years had a devastating effect on enrollment in Master of Education programs not only at Pfeiffer, but across the state as well /. D egrees and Certificates Conferred

Over a ten year period the total number of degrees and certificates conferred (graduate and undergraduate) within a fiscal year was highest in 2008-2009 (n=700). The highest number of undergraduate degrees conferred was also during the 2008-2009 fiscal year (n=264) and the highest number of graduate degrees conferred was within the 2009-2010 (n=440). In the 2015-2016 fiscal year, there were 468 degrees conferred, a decrease of about 33% since the high in 2008-2009. In 2015-2016, the Business Management/Leadership program (n=40) had the largest number of under-

graduate degrees awarded, and the Master of Health Administration (n=101) had the largest number of graduate degrees awarded. Charts showing the number of degrees conferred within each fiscal year are shown below. Chart 26 graphs the total degrees conferred by division from 2006-2007 to 2015-2016. Chart 27 graphs the degrees conferred by division for 2015-2016. The Top 5 Undergraduate Programs accounted for 56% of all Undergraduate degrees awarded. The top 5 Graduate Programs accounted for 86% of all Graduate Degrees awarded. Appendix I details the number and percent change over time by major and by division and tuition code.

Graduate Trend Data: 06-07 to 15-16 (Unduplicated Headcount)





Chart 27. Degrees/Certificates Conferred 2015-16 Graduate Data: 2015-16 (Unduplicated Headcount)

G raduation Rates

Chart 28 shows the six-year graduation rate for first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates at Pfeiffer University, starting with the Fall 2000 Freshman Class and continuing through to the Fall 2009 Freshman Class, which is the class the most recent six-year graduation rate data are available. Regardless of the size of the Freshman Class, the six-year graduation rate for Pfeiffer University is usually between 40 to 50 percent. Only for two classes (Fall 2001 and Fall 2002) was the six-year graduation rate over 50%. For the Fall 2003 and Fall 2008 cohorts, the 6-year graduation rate was about 35%. Also, while transfer data are incomplete for most years, for

the years reported, a growing percentage of students are transferring out of Pfeiffer, reaching a high of over 50% with the Fall 2008 first-year cohort. Chart 29 provides a graphic representation of Pfeiffer's six-year graduation rate. For the ten first-year cohorts shown, the data are clear. Despite year-to-year variation, the slope of the trendline (in red) is negative, showing that over time, the percentage of first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates graduating from Pfeiffer University within six years is growing smaller.

Chart 28. Cohorts History



P ersistence and Graduation

Retention of undergraduate students is an issue for Pfeiffer University, as it is for many small, private universities. All undergraduate students who first enrolled in a fall term (Fall 2005 through Fall 2014) are tracked over time. Tracking indicates that at the start of the second term, a one year undergraduate retention rate has never exceeded 72%. At the start of the third term, less than half (avg. 42%) of these students remain and an average of 11% graduate. By the start of the fourth year, less than a third (28%) are still enrolled and an average of 12% graduate.

The trend of attrition is further evidenced by graduation rates, less than half after 4 years and approximately half after 5 or 6 years.

Chart 30 shows retention and graduation rates for undergraduate students by each particular starting fall term at Pfeiffer University. Detailed information on retention can be found in Appendix K.

M isenheimer Freshman Persistence

The Fact Book highlights a few areas that are unique to each division. For the Misenheimer Undergraduate Division, the Fact Book focuses on the following: freshman persistence, trends in transfer students, commuters and residents, religious affiliation, and sports. Persistence continues to be a serious issue for Pfeiffer University. Chart 31 graphs Fall-to-Fall attrition of students who have a Freshman class standing (full-time and part-time, new students and transfers) who matriculated to Pfeiffer every Fall term, from Fall 2008 to Fall 2012. The blue bar represents the

first Fall semester enrolled (Fall 2008, Fall 2009, and so forth). The red bar is the second Fall term enrolled (i.e. for the Fall 2008 class, this would be Fall 2009). The green bar is the third Fall term enrolled (i.e. for the Fall 2008 class, this would be Fall 2010), and the violet bar is the fourth Fall term enrolled (i.e. for the Fall 2008 class, this would be Fall 2011). Regardless of the Fall semester at matriculation about one-third do not return for their second year. By their third year, over half of those freshmen have left. And over 60% (on average) do not return for their fourth year.


M isenheimer Freshman Persistence

Average persistence rates for those students who arrive with a Freshman class standing to Pfeiffer every Fall term, from Fall 2005 to Fall 2012 are expressed in Chart 32. In their first Fall term, 100% are present (naturally). By their second Fall term, less than two-thirds persist, on average. By the third Fall term, less than 50% persist.

And, lastly, less than 40% persist to their fourth Fall term, lon average. To reiterate, these figures are for those students who have a Freshman class standing to Pfeiffer every Fall term (full- and part-time, new students or transfers).


M isenheimer Undergraduates: Transfer Students

Chart 33 graphs the number of new transfer students to the Misenheimer campus per given Fall semester. In Fall 2006, 72 new transfer students enrolled. Ten years later, only 50 new transfer students enrolled, a decline of 30%. The trendline (in red)

clearly shows a marked pattern of decline among transfer student enrollment to the Misenheimer Undergraduate campus.

Trend Analysis: Fall 2006 – Fall 2015





Misenheimer Undergraduates: Commuter and Residential Students

Chart 34 graphs the percent of Misenheimer undergraduates by commuter versus resident status from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. For most of the deade in question, the ratio of residential students to commuter students was about 2-to-1, on average. From Fall 2013 to Fall 2014, however, a sharp change is observed. In Fall 2014, residential

students accounted for 70% of the Misenheimer population, while commuter students only accounted for 30% of the Misenheimer population. This 70/30 split is generally observed to continue through Fall 2015, as well.

Misenheimer Undergraduates: Religious Affiliation

In Fall 2006, students with an undeclared or unknown affiliation represented 18% of the Misenheimer Undergraduate Division enrollment. By Fall 2014, these students accounted for 38% of religious affiliation. The three denominations with the highest representation over time are (in rank order): Baptist, Methodist, and Catholic. Chart

35 graphs the percent of total Misenheimer Undergraduates by religious affiliation from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. Chart 36 provides more detail on the percent of Fall 2015 Misenheimer Undergraduates by religious affiliation. Appendix L details all religious affiliations.

Chart 35. Percent of Fall Misenheimer Enrollment by Religion







Chart 36. Fall 2015 Misenheimer Undergraduate Enrollment by Religion

Misenheimer Undergraduates: Sports

Chart 37 graphs the percent of Misenheimer Undergraduates who played a sport from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. In 2006, 40% of students played at least one sport, while 60% of Misenheimer Undergraduates did not. Over time, the percent of Misenheimer Undergraduates who played at least one sport steadily grew. By Fall 2014, the percent of students who played at least one sport (54%) eclipsed the percent of Misenheimer Undergraduates who did not play sports (46%).

Chart 38 graphs the number of students who play a sport and live on-campus from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. The number of students who play at least one sport and live on campus was fairly constant at about 320, on average for any given year. However, the number of on-campus residents who do not play a sport decreased by 25%, from 202 to 152. Examining the proportion of student athletes among the Misenheimer residential population, the percentage of students who live on-campus and play sports increased from 60% in Fall 2006 to 67% in Fall 2015. Appendix M contains figures on home residence and students who play a sport.





Chart 38. Misenheimer Undergraduate On-Campus Residents by Students Who Play Sports

Chart 39 graphs Undergraduate CPA Division enrollment by gender from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. From Fall 2006 to Fall 2013, enrollment showed a general trend of decline for both women and men. However, enrollment for both genders has increased from Fall 2013 to Fall 2015. These individual trends reflect the general enrollment trend for the Undergraduate CPA Division over the past ten years. Also, the female-to-male ratio in the UG CPA Division has increased. In Fall 2006, there were about 2 women for every 1 man. In Fall 2015, that ratio had increased to about 3 women for every 1 man.

Chart 40 shows the average age by gender for the Undergraduate CPA division from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015. The average age of female students in this division increased by 3 years, from 34.9 years in Fall 2006 to 37.9 years in Fall 2015. The average age of male students also increased over the same period, from 36.0 years in Fall 2006 to 39.6 years in Fall 2015, a net average increase of 3.6 years.

Chart 39. UG CPA Division Enrollment by Gender Trend Analysis: Fall 2006 – Fall 2015




Chart 40. UG CPA Division Enrollment by Gender and Average Age

Center for Professional Advancement (CPA): Undergraduate Demographics

Chart 41 compares enrollment at the Undergraduate CPA Division by race/ethnicity within gender between Fall 2011 and Fall 2015. While the fluctation for women between the two years in comparison was minimal, the drop in enrollment for males is noticeable. Enrollment for minority males declined by about 25%, while that for non-minority males dropped by one-third. Chart 42 provides a year-to-year breakdown of enrollment figures by race/ethnicity within gender for the UG CPA Division

from Fall 2011 to Fall 2015. The data show that enrollment declined steadily from Fall 2011 to Fall 2013, and then increased from Fall 2013 to Fall 2015. Enrollment for non-minority males remains generally weak, however.

Chart 41. Center for Professional Advancement Division Enrollment by Gender and Ethnicity Comparative Analysis:



G raduate Program

Chart 43 breaks down graduate student enrollment by gender. As shown, enrollment in this division by female students exhibited a general trend of growth from Fall 2006 to Fall 2012. However, from Fall 2012 to Fall 2015, enrollment by graduate women dropped by 35% (n=268), and over the decade in question, enrollment declined by 25% (n=164). Enrollment by male students in the Graduate Studies Division ebbed and flowed from Fall 2006 to Fall 2012. The highest enrollment by men occurred in Fall 2007 (N=327) and another peak was observed in Fall 2012 (N=298). However, from Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, enrollment by male graduate students fell by almost

35% (n=107), from 317 in Fall 2006 to 210 in Fall 2015. When considering the period from Fall 2012 to Fall 2015, enrollment by male students in the graduate division fell by almost 30% (n=58).

Chart 44 depicts average age by gender for the Graduate Studies Division. From Fall 2006 to Fall 2015, the average age of both female and male students did not show much variation.

Chart 43. Graduate Studies Enrollment by Gender Trend Analysis: Fall 2006 – Fall 2015



S tudent Charges

Chart 45 provides a comparison of Total Student Costs for the 2015-2016 academic year between Pfeiffer University and select peer institutions. Total student costs include the following: tuition, fees, room, board, and other incidental costs incurred by student (e.g., transportation and books). For the 2015-2016 academic year (Fall and Spring semesters), the total cost to attend Pfeiffer University for a full-time, first-time undergraduate student living on campus was \$41,150. Among the peer institutions selected for comparison, this amount places Pfeiffer University third lowest among the six institutions presented.

Chart 46 details the percent difference in costs of attendance between Pfeiffer University and the peer institutions selected for comparison in Chart 45. Of the five comparison schools, three cost more to attend than Pfeiffer, with Queens University in Charlotte costing almost 15% more to attend as compared to Pfeiffer. Belmont Abbey costs significantly less (just over 20%) to attend than Pfeiffer, and Gardner-Webb costs only slightly less (less than 1%) to attend, as compared to Pfeiffer.







Chart 46. Percent Difference in 2015-2016 Student Costs Select Peer Institutions Compared to Pfeiffer University

Student Tution

Chart 47 trends Pfeiffer University Undergraduate tuition costs from the 2012-2013 academic year to the 2016-2017 academic year. These figures are the total cost of full-time tuition for the academic year in question (Fall and Spring semesters) for the Undergraduate Misenheimer Division. These figures do not include fees, room and board, nor any other incidental costs (e.g. transportation or books). Over the five academic years in question, undergraduate tuition rose by \$5,500, an increase of

almost 25% over the five years in question. Chart 48 shows the percentage increase in tuition over the prior year. For example, undergraduate tuition in 2012-2013 increased 6.0% over the 2011-2012 academic year. Undergraduate tuition in 2016-2017 increased 6.9% from 2015-2016. Over the past five years, full-time undergraduate tuition increased by about 6% each year over the prior year.

Trend Analysis: 2012-2013 to 2016-2017





Chart 48. Undergraduate Tuition Percent Increase Over Prior Year
